Birth to at least 2 years old

Rear-facing in an infant or convertible car seat

At least 2 years old <u>AND</u> has outgrown the rear-facing car seat by height or weight Forward-facing car seat with an internal harness 169.685.4a(a)(2)



At least 4 years old <u>AND</u> has outgrown the forward-facing car seat by height or weight Booster seat using vehicle lap belt and shoulder belt

169.685.4a(a)(3)



At least 9 years old or has outgrown the booster seat, <u>AND</u> can pass the 5-Step Test Vehicle seat using vehicle lap belt and shoulder belt

169.685.4a(a)(4)

- If a child fits in more than one category, place them in the more protective category. 169.685.4a(a)(6)
- Children under the age of 13 must sit in a back seat, if possible. 169.685.4a(a)(5)
- Every driver who transports a child under the age of 18 years in a motor vehicle, is required to have the child restrained in a car seat or seat belt. 169.685.4a(c)

The Minnesota Child Passenger Safety Law gives best practice guidance to caregivers on car seats, booster seats and seat belts for safely transporting children.

At least 2 years old <u>AND</u> has outgrown the rear-facing car seat by height or weight Forward-facing car seat with an internal harness 169.685.4a(a)(2)



At least 4 years old <u>AND</u> has outgrown the forward-facing car seat by height or weight Booster seat using vehicle lap belt and shoulder belt

169.685.4a(a)(3)



At least 9 years old or has outgrown the booster seat, <u>AND</u> can pass the 5-Step Test Vehicle seat using vehicle lap belt and shoulder belt

169.685.4a(a)(4)

- If a child fits in more than one category, place them in the more protective category. 169.685.4a(a)(6)
- Children under the age of 13 must sit in a back seat, if possible.
 169.685.4a(a)(5)
- Every driver who transports a child under the age of 18 years in a motor vehicle, is required to have the child restrained in a car seat or seat belt. 169.685.4a(c)

THE 5-STEP TEST

The 5-Step Test is a way to know when a child can ride without a booster seat. A child can safely ride on the vehicle seat with the lap and shoulder belt when the child can do ALL 5 steps.



The child sits all the way back against the vehicle seat



Their knees bend over the edge of the vehicle seat



The shoulder belt snugly crosses the center of the chest & shoulder, NOT THE NECK



The child sits correctly, without slouching, for the entire ride



The lap belt fits snugly across the hips near the top of the thighs, NOT THE ABDOMEN

Subd. 5. Violation; Petty Misdemeanor. 169.685.5(a)

- (a) Any motor vehicle operator who violates subdivision 4a is guilty of a petty misdemeanor and may be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than \$50. The fine may be waived or the amount reduced if the motor vehicle operator produces evidence that within 14 days after the date of the violation a child passenger restraint system meeting federal motor vehicle safety standards was purchased or obtained for the exclusive use of the operator.
- (b) At the time of issuance of a citation under this subdivision, a peace officer may provide to the violator information on obtaining a free or low-cost child passenger restraint system.
- (c) The fines collected for violations of this subdivision must be deposited in the Minnesota child passenger restraint and education account.

- (a) Any motor vehicle operator who violates subdivision 4a is guilty of a petty misdemeanor and may be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than \$50. - (b) At the time of issuance of a citation under this subdivision, a peace officer may provide to the violator information on obtaining a free or low-cost child passenger restraint system.
- (c) The fines collected for violations of this subdivision must be deposited in the Minnesota child passenger restraint and education account.
